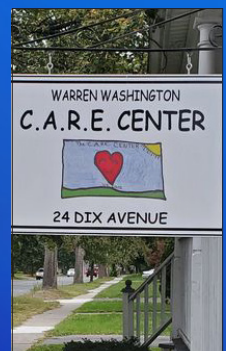

WHO WE ARE



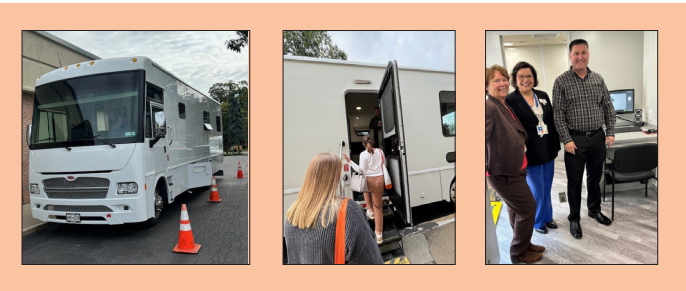
The New York State Children's Alliance, Inc. is a 47-member organization serving 61 counties and 6 tribal nations. We are committed to improving the community response to children and families impacted by abuse.

OUR MISSION

The mission of the New York State Children's Alliance, Inc. (NYSCA) is to promote the development, growth and continuation of Multidisciplinary Teams (MDTs) and Child Advocacy Centers (CACs) throughout New York State in order to provide healing and justice to abused and neglected children and their families.

NYSCA BY THE NUMBERS

- 18 in-person and virtual training sessions offered to our member CACs and their MDT members.
- 763 professionals received advanced-level training on topics related to the multidisciplinary response to child abuse.
- 30 visits to CACs for training, technical assistance, regional meetings, and events.
- 592 requests for technical assistance were answered.
- 68 peer support calls including: Leadership, Victim Advocates, Mental Health, Outreach and Education, MDT Coordinator, Medical Provider, Public Policy, and CAC Mobile Unit.
- 72,197 bookmarks, coloring books, and outreach materials shipped to CACs.
- 353 technical assistance requests for data collection and reporting.
- 513 social media posts (Facebook, Instagram, X, LinkedIn)
- 50 email campaigns



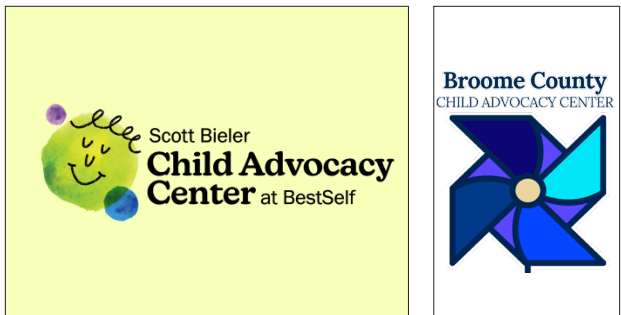
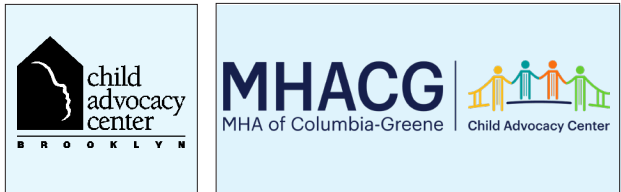
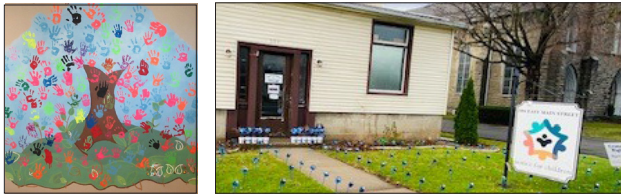

OUR SERVICES

A comprehensive investigation is initiated with each new case of abuse referred to a Child Advocacy Center. With the safety and protection of the child as its highest priority, a highly skilled team including advocates, forensic interviewers, law enforcement, child protective services, prosecutors, medical and mental health professionals assess each case with sensitivity and care.



12,848 FORENSIC INTERVIEWS

Specially trained Forensic Interviewers work with the MDT to ensure clients are not interviewed unnecessarily and allow them to do so in a safe, legally sound and neutral setting.

370,566 VICTIM ADVOCACY CONTACTS

CACs stand in the gap for the healing of a child from abuse, focusing on reduced trauma for the child. Victim Advocates provide resources, support and training with a compassionate, listening ear, so that each child gets the care they deserve.

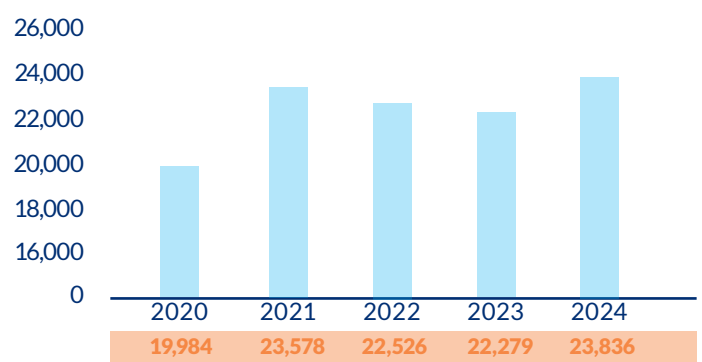
3,434 MEDICAL EXAMS/TREATMENTS

A medical exam, similar to a pediatrician’s check-up, may be offered to a child to determine the nature and extent of the abuse. These exams provide the team with valuable information to prosecute the offender and help the child heal.

1,707 INITIATED COUNSELING/THERAPY

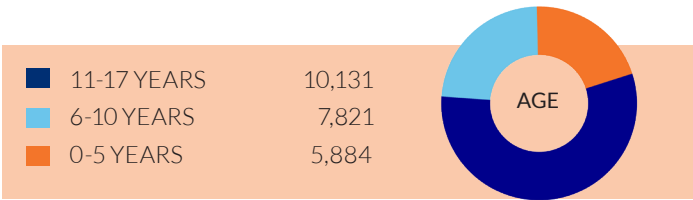
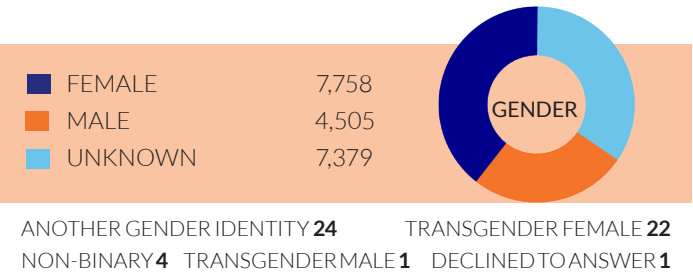
Each child and their family are offered specialized evidence-based, trauma-focused, mental health services, proven to be effective in coping with the trauma of sexual and physical abuse.

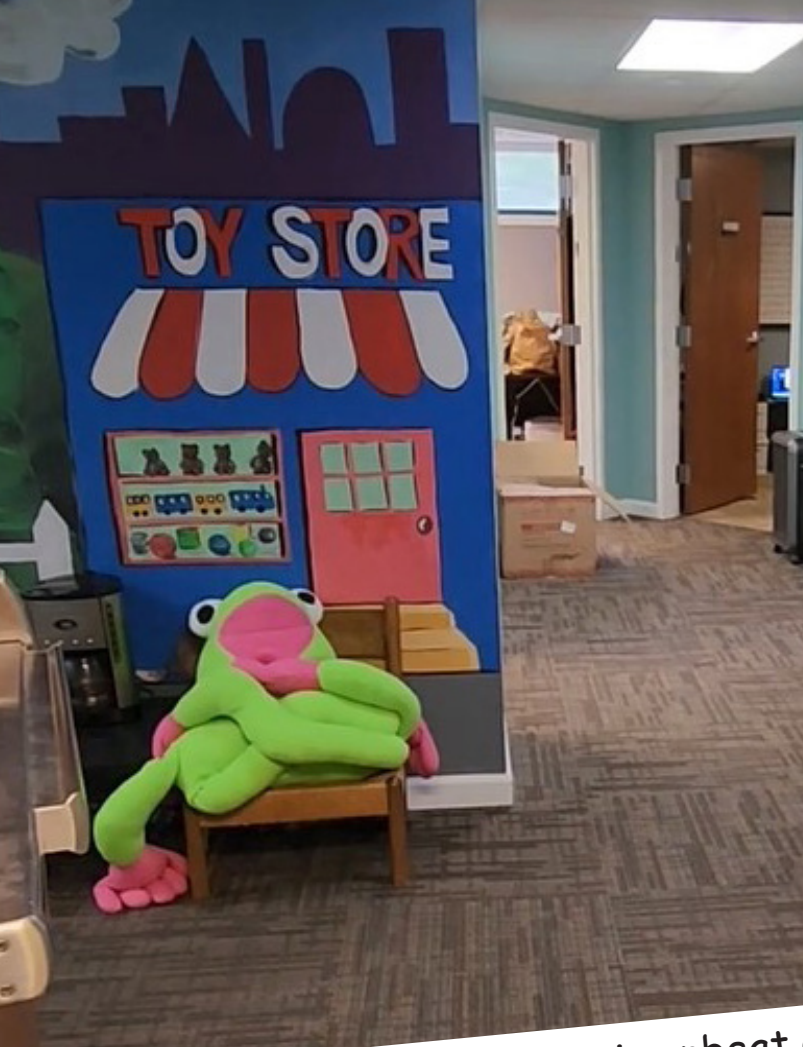

OUR IMPACT ACROSS THE STATE

The Outcome Measurement System (OMS) is a standardized, research-based set of surveys designed to measure Child Advocacy Center (CAC) performance based on feedback from families and MDT partners including a Mental Health Services Survey.

All participating CACs measure the same core items, allowing CACs to benchmark their performance against state, regional, and national results. The surveys are available in both English and Spanish. OMS is designed to capture two measurable outcomes:

1. The CAC facilitates healing for children and caregivers.
2. The MDT approach results in more collaborative and efficient case investigations.

From forensic interviewing and case coordination to vicarious trauma and team dynamics, attendees left with new strategies, sharper skills, and practical tools to bring back to their Child Advocacy Center.

For the first time ever, we launched a pre-conference session, and the turnout was incredible. More than seventy attendees came early, ready to get a head start on learning and networking.

The NYSCA team is proud to host the only statewide conference built by and for CAC & MDT professionals. No generic tracks. No one-size-fits-all. Just relevant, intentional, and precise content for our members doing the critical work at Child Advocacy Centers.

The 2024 conference exemplified our commitment to delivering role-specific professional development while fostering multidisciplinary relationships that are at the center of this work.

Once again, the conference offered a Networking Session with our colleagues featuring a competitive game of CAC Bingo. The evening was filled with enjoyable conversation and connecting with new friends.

Empowering New York's Child Advocacy Professionals

The New York State Children's Alliance continues to lead the way in educating Children's Advocacy Centers (CACs) and Multidisciplinary Teams (MDTs) across New York State. In an ever-evolving landscape, NYSCA remains committed to delivering timely, relevant, and impactful training programs that address the changing needs of child advocacy professionals and their communities.

In 2024, NYSCA successfully trained 763 staff members from CACs and MDTs across the state through 18 comprehensive training sessions. These programs spanned a wide range of disciplines and topics, ensuring participants were equipped with the critical knowledge and skills needed to address the complex challenges they face while supporting children and families.

KEY AREAS OF FOCUS:

Youth with Problematic Sexual Behaviors: Training provided strategies and interventions to address this sensitive and often misunderstood issue.

Victim Advocacy: A three-part training series tailored to varying levels of experience offered MDT and Victim Advocates progressive learning opportunities, enhancing their ability to provide effective support and resources.

Project FIND Training: Delivered in a two-day, in-person format, supported MDT members and Forensic Interviewers in their practices to better serve children with disabilities, mental health conditions, limited language capacity, or diverse cultural backgrounds.

Conflict Resolution within MDTs: Recognizing that effective collaboration is essential for successful outcomes, NYSCA emphasized techniques to improve communication and teamwork among multidisciplinary professionals.

Looking ahead, NYSCA remains dedicated to strengthening the capabilities of CACs and MDTs throughout New York State. Our commitment is to expand access to specialized, high-impact training programs that respond to the emerging needs of our members and the communities they serve.

STATEWIDE | OUTREACH



The One Too Many NY 5K to end child abuse was launched in 2020 during the pandemic when Child Advocacy Centers (CACs) had to cancel all their fundraising events. This virtual 5K became a beacon of hope, allowing the CACs to generate crucial revenue. Five years later, the event continues to thrive, with another successful 5K completed in 2024.

Fifteen Child Advocacy Centers and the New York State Children's Alliance participated in the event, offering virtual, in-person, and hybrid options. Together, they raised over \$30,000 from registrations and secured numerous local sponsorships. Participants in the 5K had the flexibility to choose any day between Friday, September 13th–Sunday, September 15th, to run, roll, or walk. They selected their own routes—whether in their neighborhood, a local park, or even on a treadmill. Over 700 participants, including family members, colleagues, children, and their canine companions, joined us for the One Too Many NY 5K annual event!

The NYSCA presented several statewide awards, including Best Time for both male and female participants, Best View on the Run, and "Dogs Need a 5K Too."

Congratulations to the CACs with the highest number of registrations! In the ongoing competition between the Cortland County CAC and the Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse (CPCA) in Dutchess County, Cortland claimed first place, while CPCA took second. For the first time, the Child Advocacy Center of Columbia and Greene Counties joined the top three, coming in third place.

ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

The evening before the Membership Meeting, NYSCA hosted a night at the ballpark. Colleagues gathered for an enjoyable evening filled with food, engaging conversation, and an exciting game as they cheered on the Syracuse Mets. This joyful gathering included the NYSCA Board, staff, and member CACs, providing an opportunity for the Board to present outgoing Executive Director Linda Cleary with a gift in recognition of her years of service. Her colleagues also took the time to share their best wishes for her well-deserved retirement.



We kicked off our annual membership meeting with activities facilitated by Team Adventure. Over forty CAC/MDT members, along with NYSCA staff and Board members, participated in activities designed to promote movement, laughter, and the use of adventure and fun as effective learning tools to strengthen their teams.

Then, the NYSCA team presented the 2023 annual report, which highlighted the tremendous work of Child Advocacy Centers and showcased several of the Chapter's projects and initiatives.

A strong commitment to communicating with both our membership and the broader community.

NYSCA ensured regular communication with our partners by sending out monthly NYSCA Updates, training newsletters, quarterly newsletters, email campaigns, website updates and social media posts.

Huddle Calls: The chapter kept in touch with CAC and MDT members through our Huddle Calls and introduced a

Medical Huddle Call: This call was designed to help medical providers across NYS stay connected with NYSCA and with one another.

Spanish Peer Review Calls: NYSCA is proud to support our CAC community and the critical services they provide to children and their families. We frequently receive requests from our members for training and support to better serve their clients. In 2024, we responded to this need by establishing peer review calls for Spanish-speaking Forensic Interviewers. This platform allows them to meet and discuss the successes and challenges they face in conducting Spanish-language interviews.



Revamping "Less Is More"
In late 2024, NYSCA began a major overhaul of Less Is More—a core training tool that helps CACs educate mandated reporters and youth-serving organizations on recognizing and responding to signs of child abuse.

This is more than an update—it's a full reimagining of how we empower professionals to act early and protect children. The revised curriculum reinforces the importance of listening to disclosures without probing or investigating and focuses on gathering only essential information.

To guide this process, NYSCA assembled a statewide committee of CAC and MDT professionals, ensuring the new version reflects the diverse needs to all NYS communities.

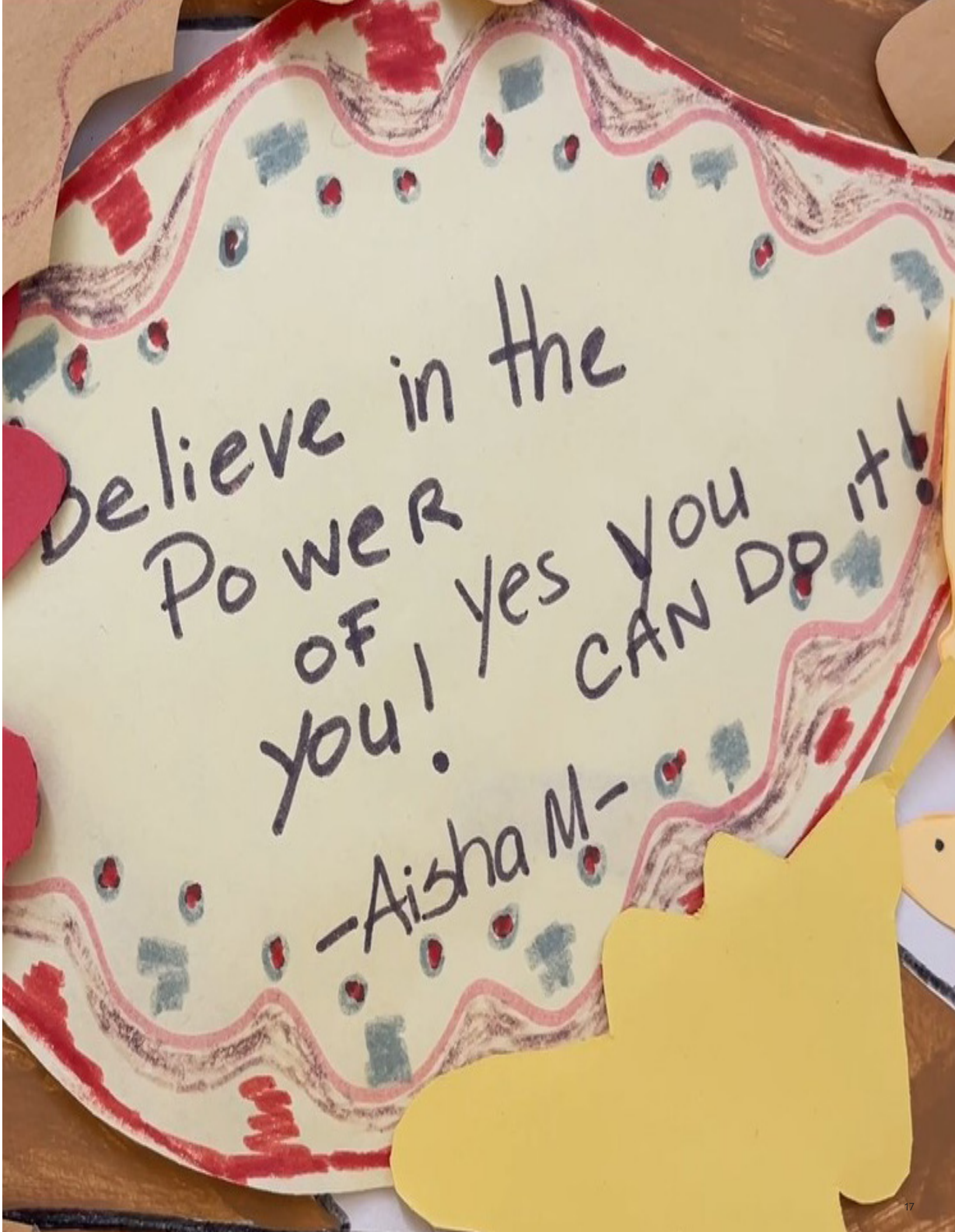
In 2024, NYSCA's April Child Abuse Prevention campaign continued with a series of short walk-through videos highlighting some of our statewide Child Advocacy Centers. All the videos were shared on NYSCA's social media throughout April.

In addition, NYSCA highlighted the public awareness campaign on the home page of their website with links to more information about how to recognize child abuse and neglect, and what actions the community can take to help prevent child abuse.

PUBLIC POLICY

Building on the framework and relationships built in 2023, NYSCA and our members continued to foster relationships between CACs and state and federal elected officials to garner support for funding and to strengthen laws to protect children.

Day of Action in Albany

In February, NYSCA and members of CACs traveled to the state capitol to meet with legislators to urge them to increase funding for CACs and to support our Legislative Agenda. Joined by members of 13 CACs (The Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse, YWCA, Madison County CAC, CAC of the Finger Lakes, Putnam County CAC, Orange County CAC, Oneida County Sheriff's office, Schenectady County CAC, Clinton County CAC, Saratoga Center for Families, START Children's Center, The Safe Center LI, and MHA of Columbia-Greene), we were able to meet with sixteen legislative offices, many of whom co-sponsored legislation on our Legislative Agenda. In addition, we successfully secured an additional \$2 million for Child Advocacy Centers across NYS through the Senate one-house budget.

Hill Day 2024

In June, NYSCA participated in "Hill Day" at the National Children's Alliance Leadership Conference in Washington, D.C. This year, we were joined by members of 12 CACs from across the state (Chemung County CAC, Chautauqua County CAC, Safe Horizon (Bronx & Queens CACs), YWCA, START Children's Center, Schenectady County CAC, CAC of the Finger Lakes, CAC of Madison County, Cayuga County CAC, Putnam County CAC, and The Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse), our team visited 10 legislative offices, including Senator Gillibrand, Congressman Lawler, Congressman Tonko, Congressman Molinaro, Congressman Stefanik, Assemblyman Langworthy, Congresswoman Tenney, Congressman LaLota, Congressman Ryan, and Congressman Torres. Although unavailable for in-person meetings on Hill Day, we were also able to meet with Congressman Morelle and Congressman Nadler virtually.

During these meetings, we discussed the challenges CACs face with looming cuts to VOCA funding and encouraged them to co-sponsor the Crime Victims Fund Stabilization Act of 2024. Through the course of our work, 100% of the members of Congress we met with signed on to support VOCA funding, successfully securing 12 co-sponsors for this critical piece of legislation designed to stabilize federal funding for CACs and all victim service providers.

Legislative Regional Meetings

NYSCA facilitated a series of regional meetings across New York State to strengthen our relationships with Child Advocacy Centers and members of the NYS Senate and Assembly. During our sessions, we discussed the challenges faced by CACs and provided practical steps legislators could take to help support CACs. These meetings also increased awareness of Child Advocacy Centers in the Senate and Assembly for members before they began the 2025 NYS Legislative Session, ensuring the needs of CACs were top of mind as they enter budget negotiations in January. Thanks to the graciousness of our site hosts, we were also able to provide policymakers a first-hand look at a few Child Advocacy Centers, including The Scott Bieler CAC, McMahon-Ryan CAC, and the START Children's Center with their elected officials. These meetings provide CAC staff with foundational understanding and updates on what is happening in the state.
