Participants will be introduced to the various forms of government within Indian Country including tribal sovereignty and the relationship between tribal, federal, and state governments. Lastly, participants will gain a deeper understanding of the unique legal landscape that governs Indian lands, with a particular emphasis on the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA). (Place Room)

Righting the Ship: Taking a Rural CAC From Sinking to Thriving PRESENTED BY: Amy Lingerfelt, Director of a Caring Place Child Advocacy Center

Follow the case study of A Caring Place Child Advocacy Center, a small independent CAC in Eastern Ohio. In 2021, A Caring Place almost closed due to a severe lack of funding, lack of staff, and lack of community buy in. Currently, this CAC is doing very well and has seen significant growth. The presentation will examine the timeline leading up to the Center almost closing and the red flags along the way. We will discuss red flags Centers may be encountering. Followed by the action items that ultimately turned A Caring Place CAC around. (Win Room)

Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC): Looking Inside the Box- Part 1

This training will cover the basics of Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC) with examples from the region that were coordinated through an MDT response and those that missed the basic premise of a team approach. We will explore the alarming trends of child sexual abuse images and sextortion, bringing us right back to the need for an MDT response and the foundation of the CAC. Lastly, we will look at what we have inside our box to make a difference in eradicating the Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children, understanding that funding for this crisis is not keeping up with the ever-growing number of victims of this heinous crime. Updated Accreditation Standards for CACs: What We've Learned in the First Year

This workshop features the changes to NCA's standards of accreditation for Children's Advocacy Centers (CACs), and what we have learned from the first year of evaluating Centers under these new standards. NCA will discuss the challenges and triumphs seen in CACs across the country since the standards went into effect on Jan. 1st, 2023.

Using data from site visits in 2023, we will discuss what components of the standards are the most challenging for CACs, including both new requirements as well as existing requirements that still pose difficulties for Centers.

Finally, we will discuss the optional standards introduced in 2023. After a brief overview of the 3 optional standards, we will look at the data of how many Centers opted into each, what challenges were found in those reviews, and the number of CACs now accredited under these optional standards. We will conclude with a Q&A sharing of personal experiences. (Win Room)

Serving Neurodivergent Children in the Rural CAC PRESENTED BY: Amy Lingerfelt, Director of a Caring Place Child Advocacy Center

This presentation aims to be affirming of neurological differences, or neurodiversities. After defining common terms used, participants will be invited to discuss what they are seeing regarding neurodivergent children at their CACs. Common barriers will be discussed, how they came about, and specific interventions that can be used. There will be a discussion on the intersectionality between neurodivergence and trauma, and the implications this intersection has for the children CACs serve. CODY BYRNS

Cody Byrns is an internationally recognized speaker and a number one best-selling author. In May of 2013, Cody's life was drastically changed. While stopped at a red light on the highway, Cody was rear-ended by a box-truck that failed to stop. As a result, hewas considered dead until first responders saw his hand move. He received many injuries that day, including severe burns to almost 40% of his body. After years of countless surgeries and rehabilitation, Cody has chosen to not allow his scars to keep him bound in bitterness and defeat. Instead, he uses his story to uplift others.

RICHARD GUERRY

Richard Guerry is the founder of the non-profit organization the Institute for Responsible Online and Cell-Phone Communication (IROC2.org) and one of the nation's most sought-after speakers on digital safety, empathy and mindfulness. He is the author of multiple cyber safety books and has been a featured speaker at numerous national & international conferences. Richard has appeared as an expert on Radio Disney, CNN, FOX, CBS, MTV's Thin Line Campaign, as well as in Parade Magazine and many local, regional, and international publications to help humans better understand how to wield the power of evolving technology with wisdom and responsibility through solution-oriented concepts critical to anyone using digital tools.

TIM BOEHLERT

Tim Boehlert is a 22-year veteran of the Oneida Indian Nation Tribal Police and a Federal Officer with the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Tim is currently assigned as a Community Police Officer for the Oneida Indian Nation Tribal Police.

AMY LINGERFELT

Amy is the Director and an Advocate at A Caring Place Child Advocacy Center in Jefferson County, Ohio. Her educational background includes a degree in psychology and leadership, and a master's in business administration. She has been recognized as an Everyday Hero by the Ohio Children's Trust Fund for her prevention education efforts.

TAMMY M. SNEED

Tammy M. Sneed is the Director of Connecticut's Human Anti-Trafficking Response Team (HART) for the Department of Children and Families (DCF), Office of Human Trafficking Services. As a national expert with close to 30 years of experience in Female-Responsive Programming for adolescent girls, she specializes in programming for youth in the legal system. She has developed and implemented training models educating local and state police departments on how to work with high-risk youth, resulting in significant arrest reductions and successful outcomes for youth. In her role as the Director of HART, she is committed to eradicating child trafficking in the state through education, collaboration, and partnerships. Tammy has presented, consulted, and worked with almost all 50 states, including Washington, DC, at the Senate and White House. Tammy co-leads the Governor's Task Force on Justice for Abused Children in Connecticut, focused on ensuring all child abuse victims receive appropriate services and support and the full extent of what the legal system can provide to these victims. As a foster/ adoptive mother, she has developed specialized training for mentors and foster and adoptive parents and served as a mentor for forever families parenting adolescent girls and child victims of trafficking.

SHELLEY HITZEL

Shelley Hitzel has been on staff at the Child Advocacy Center of Niagara since 2010. She began her career as an emergency room victim advocate, providing crisis response and support to adult and child victims of crime. She has held various roles at the CAC over the years, transitioning to the role of Executive Director in March 2020. She has coordinated the multidisciplinary response for over 1,200 child abuse cases. In addition to her work at the CAC, Shelley has been on staff at the Institute on Trauma and Trauma Informed Care since 2015. She serves as the Project Coordinator for SAMHSA's How Being Trauma-Informed Improves Criminal Justice System Response and as Trauma Informed Child Welfare Liaison. Shelley holds a master's degree in social work, a BA in Psychology and Criminal Justice and a trauma counseling certification from the University at Buffalo.

CAPTAIN TRACY STEEN

Captain Tracy Steen has over 18 years of experience with the Niagara County Sheriff's Office and currently oversees the Criminal Investigation Bureau. She began her career working as a road patrol deputy before moving to the Crime Scene Investigation Unit. Captain Steen was promoted to Criminal Investigator in 2011, where her focus was on Special Victims Investigations. Captain Steen was ultimately promoted to Lieutenant of the Criminal Investigation Bureau and then Captain in 2021. Captain Steen has a Master's Degree in Criminal Justice Administration and currently serves with the United States Coast Guard Investigative Services as a Federal Agent.

NANCY HARRIS

Nancy's career in nursing spans 40 years during which she has worked in pediatrics, neonatal ICU (Intensive Care Unit), hospitalist, and emergency services. While working in the emergency department for Samaritan Hospital she served as the Manager for the Hospitals Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner program. Nancy has completed several sexual assault forensic examiner and pediatric trainings, and during her career she has performed over 2000 sexual assault exams. In 2009, Nancy earned her certification as an adult nurse practitioner from SAGE College in Albany, NY. Nancy was instrumental in developing a system wide program to include four hospitals and two Child Advocacy Centers in the capital region. The regional CAC (Child Advocacy Centers) current program covers 27 Counties in NY State, and Nancy is the acting Medical Manager. Nancy is a co-founder and Medical Manager for the TELESAFE Program (Pilot program provided by an OVS (Office of Victim Services) Grant, providing services across New York State for the last four years. Nancy is a member of numerous MDT's (multidisciplinary team), Child fatality Review teams, NYS Medical workgroup for NYS and active with many local and international organizations. Nancy and a team of colleagues created and provided free pediatric sane training (with the help of NYSCA (New York State Children's Alliance)) for all medical providers in NYS and has developed a preceptorship program for those providers. Nancy has been the recipient of the "TEAL" award in 2020 which was presented by Albany County SART Team, "Making a Difference" Award in 2022 presented by NYSCA and in 2023 the "Distinguished Fellow" award from IAFN (International Association of Forensic Nursing).

ALYSSA TODD

Alyssa Todd worked as an Investigative Social Worker for Vermont CPS for almost five years, then moved to Philadelphia for grad school, where she continued to work with youth in foster care. She moved back to Vermont and became the Director and Forensic Interviewer of a small Associate Member center in Brattleboro, VT in 2012. In 2016 the Center became fully Accredited with NCA under Alyssa's leadership. Alyssa joined NCA in September 2019 as a member of the accreditation team and assisted with the most recent revision of the Standards for Accredited Centers. Alyssa provides training and technical assistance to CACs as they navigate the accreditation process. She is particularly interested in forensic interviewing and vicarious trauma.

MYIA HILL

Myia Hill is the Communications Manager at the Northeast Regional Children's Advocacy Center (NRCAC), where she brings creativity and strategic thinking to NRCAC's branding, marketing materials, website, and social media presence. Co-founding A Better Way in 2017, she has been a driving force in educating law enforcement and other professionals. Additionally, A Better Way supports abuse victims in a variety of ways. Through her tireless efforts and collaborations, she continues to be a beacon of hope and change in the fight against abuse.

DOMINIQUE ALTAMARI

Dominique Altamari, LCSW, is a therapist at The New York Center for Children (NYCC). Dominique received her Master's of Social Work from The Columbia University School of Social Work. Prior to joining the team at NYCC, Dominique worked as a therapist at The J.E. and Z.B. Butler Center for Children and Families, a Montefiore Child Outpatient Psychiatry Department satellite clinic that specializes in child abuse and trauma. At NYCC, Dominique provides trauma-focused individual therapy to children, adolescents, young adults, and non-offending parents. Additionally, Dominique runs therapeutic groups for adolescents who have experienced trauma. Dominique is also SIFI certified and currently supervises a master's level social work intern.

JOE MUROFF

Joseph Muroff is in his 38th year at the Bronx County District Attorney's Office in NYC. He is a member of Bronx DA Darcel Clark's Executive Staff as Chief of the Special Victims Division. The Division includes the Office's Child Abuse/ Sex Crimes Bureau, the Domestic Violence Bureau, the Crime Victims Assistance Bureau and the Human Trafficking Unit. Mr. Muroff was directly involved in the planning, development and implementation of several notable institutions in Bronx County, including: "Bronx Community Solutions", the Bronx Integrated Domestic Violence (IDV) Court Part, the Bronx Sexual Assault Task Force, and the co-located Bronx Child Advocacy Center. Mr. Muroff has spoken and lectured on a wide variety of topics in the fields of Domestic Violence, Sex Crimes, Child Abuse and Trauma Informed Prosecutions to numerous outside organizations, such as the NYPD, NYC Corporation Counsel, the New York State Prosecutor's Training Institute (NYPTI), and numerous community-based organizations and associations. He has also served on the faculty of the National College of District Attorneys (NCDA) and as an advisor to the American Association of Prosecuting Attorneys (APA). For the last several years, Mr. Muroff has served as co-chair of the New York State DA's Association's Special Victims and Domestic Violence (SVDV) Legislative Subcommittee. He has been actively involved in advancing legislation in NY State which positively impacts victims and survivors of crime.

In 2007, Mr. Muroff was honored at the 30th Anniversary Celebration of the Crime Victims Treatment Center of St. Luke's-Roosevelt Hospital Center, in recognition of his "tireless commitment to assisting victims of violent crimes". In 2017, Mr. Muroff received the "Prosecutor of the Year, Executive Leadership Award" from the New York Prosecutor's Training Institute. This award is given to a prosecutor "who exemplifies strong leadership, is responsible for innovative and important programs, and thereby enhances criminal justice throughout the State." In January of 2020, Mr. Muroff became a Board Member of the New York State Children's Alliance (NYSCA).

KIM MADDEN

Kim Madden, MEd, LCMHC, is a Child Forensic Interview Specialist and Trainer at the National Children's Advocacy Center (NCAC). She began conducting forensic interviews in 1995.
