Dear NYSCA Friends,

Serving as Chair of the New York State Children's Alliance in 2025 has been an honor and a reminder of the strength of New York's Child Advocacy Center community. Across the state, Child Advocacy Centers and multidisciplinary partners continued to work together with professionalism, compassion, and a shared commitment to protecting children and supporting families. The dedication of Theresa Roth, the NYSCA staff and volunteers, and our member CACs continue to strengthen trauma-informed services and improve outcomes for children throughout New York.



This year marked an important milestone for NYSCA's annual conference. Held in Albany—a new location—the conference welcomed more than 200 registrants for the first time in our organization's history. The record attendance reflected both the continued growth of the CAC movement in New York State and the strong desire among professionals to collaborate, learn from one another, and advance best practices in the field.

NYSCA also achieved a significant advocacy victory this year with the successful effort to increase New York State funding for Child Advocacy Centers from \$7.2 million to \$14.4 million. This historic investment represents meaningful recognition of the critical role CACs play in child protection, victim services, and multidisciplinary response. It also reflects the collective voice and hard work of CAC leaders, MDT

Dear Friends,

As I reflect on 2025, I am filled with both pride and hope—pride in what we have accomplished together, and hope for what we are building for children across New York State.



At NYSCA, our mission is to support and strengthen New York's Child Advocacy Centers and their multidisciplinary team partners so that every child who experiences abuse is met with a response that is as courageous, coordinated, and compassionate as they deserve.

This year, we reached a historic milestone. Through strong advocacy and a unified voice, New York doubled its investment in Child Advocacy Centers—from \$7.2 million to \$14.4 million. This moment is a powerful affirmation of the essential role CACs and MDTs play in protecting children and supporting families. NYSCA is proud to stand beside our network of CACs, helping to elevate their voices and advance the resources they need.

We also continued to strengthen the systems that surround children, including updates to our Less is More training for mandated reporters—ensuring those responsible for identifying abuse have current, trauma-informed guidance when children need them most.

In 2025, we continued to bring the field together in meaningful ways. This year, we moved our Leadership Conference to the Desmond Hotel in Albany to welcome a record 200 attendees—creating space for connection, shared learning, and renewed purpose. The response was overwhelming: 99% said the conference met their expectations, and 98% would recommend it to a colleague. These moments remind us that we are not alone in this work—and that together, we are stronger.

This spirit of connection extended into our communities as well. By introducing a peer-to-peer fundraising platform for the One Too Many 5K, we helped CACs engage supporters in new and powerful ways, raising more than \$15,000 to directly support their work.

Across the state, CACs and their multidisciplinary teams continue to show up every day for children and families—ensuring they are heard, supported, and not alone. In 2025, they served more than 30,000 children and their families.

As you read this report, I hope you feel both pride in what we have accomplished and inspiration for what lies ahead. Together, we are building a response to child abuse that reflects the strength, dignity, and resilience of the children we serve.

WHO WE ARE



The New York State Children's Alliance, Inc. is a 47-member organization serving 61 counties and 6 tribal nations. We are committed to improving the community response to children and families impacted by abuse.

OUR MISSION

The mission of the New York State Children's Alliance, Inc. (NYS CA) is to promote the development, growth and continuation of Multidisciplinary Teams (MDTs) and Child Advocacy Centers (CACs) throughout New York State in order to provide healing and justice to abused and neglected children and their families.

NYS CA BY THE NUMBERS

- 23 in-person and virtual training sessions offered to our member CACs and their MDT members.
- 1,083 professionals received advanced-level training on topics related to the multidisciplinary response to child abuse.
- 32 visits to CACs for training, technical assistance, regional meetings, and events.
- 907 requests for technical assistance were answered.
- 78 peer support calls including: Leadership, Victim Advocates, Mental Health, Outreach and Education, MDT Coordinator, Medical Provider, Public Policy, and CAC Mobile Unit.
- 32,700 bookmarks, coloring books, and outreach materials shipped to CACs.
- 571 technical assistance requests for data collection and reporting.
- 992 social media posts (Facebook, Instagram, X, LinkedIn)
- 56 email campaigns

OUR SERVICES

A comprehensive investigation is initiated with each new case of abuse referred to a Child Advocacy Center. With the safety and protection of the child as its highest priority, a highly skilled team including advocates, forensic interviewers, law enforcement, child protective services, prosecutors, medical and mental health professionals assess each case with sensitivity and care.



12,848 FORENSIC INTERVIEWS

Specially trained Forensic Interviewers work with the MDT to ensure clients are not interviewed unnecessarily and allow them to do so in a safe, legally sound and neutral setting.

362,988 VICTIM ADVOCACY CONTACTS

CACs stand in the gap for the healing of a child from abuse, focusing on reduced trauma for the child. Victim Advocates provide resources, support and training with a compassionate, listening ear, so that each child gets the care they deserve.

3,424 MEDICAL EXAMS/TREATMENTS

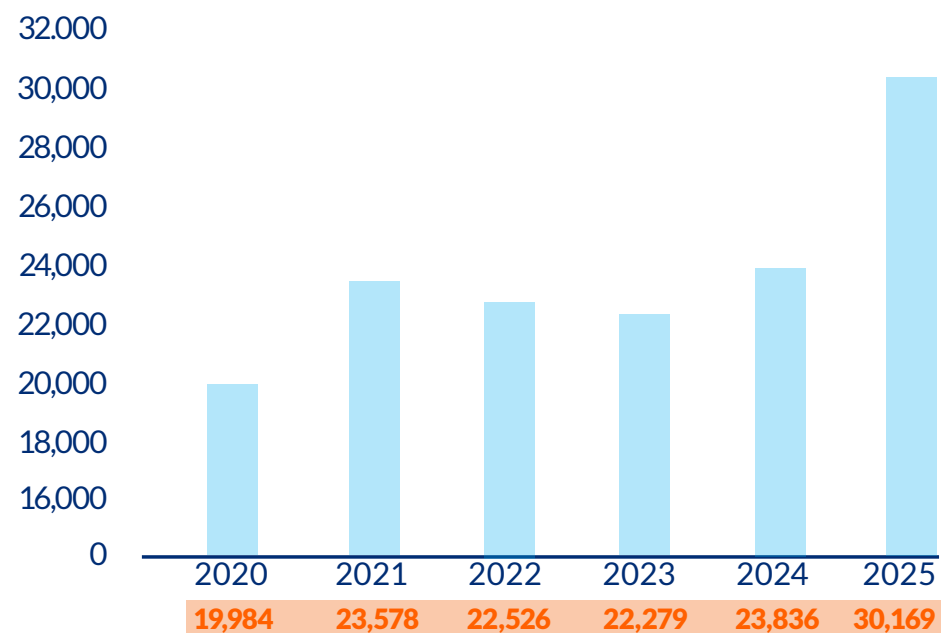
A medical exam, similar to a pediatrician's check-up, may be offered to a child to determine the nature and extent of the abuse. These exams provide the team with valuable information to prosecute the offender and help the child heal.

3,897 REFERRALS TO COUNSELING

1,752 INITIATED COUNSELING/THERAPY

Each child and their family are offered specialized evidence-based, trauma-focused, mental health services, proven to be effective in coping with the trauma of sexual and physical abuse.

NYS CHILDREN SERVED 2020-2025

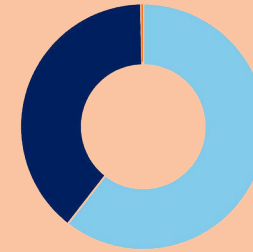


WHO WE SERVE

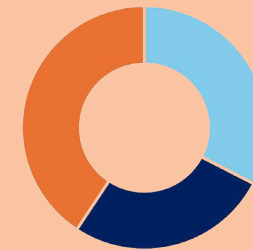

OUR IMPACT ACROSS THE STATE

Outcome Measurement System (OMS) is a standardized, research-based set of surveys designed to measure Child Advocacy Center (CAC) performance based on feedback from families and MDT partners including a Mental Health Services Survey.

The NYSCA team welcomed over 200 attendees to our 2025 Leadership Conference, held in October in Albany, NY. This milestone event marked our largest conference to date, drawing participants from eight states and international partners, and became one of our most dynamic and impactful gatherings yet.

For the first time attendees had access to more than 25 advanced level workshops, creating an engaging learning experience across all MDT disciplines. Sessions covered a wide range of critical and relevant topics, including MDT coordination techniques, enhancing forensic interviewing skills, CAC leadership development, preparing to testify within the courts, specific strategies for CAC fundraising, outreach and education practices, and emerging trends such as internet crimes against children, YPSB cases, and presenting evidence within a forensic interview. True to NYSCA’s mission and values, many sessions were led by our own members, highlighting the expertise and dedication of professionals doing this work every day!

For the second year in a row, we welcomed attendees to join us for our preconference session, setting the tone for an interactive conference experience. Participants were introduced to the FORECAST model, a problem-based learning simulation that allowed them to step into real world decision making and see the direct impact on the child, family, and multidisciplinary team. It was a powerful, hands-on opportunity exploring how choices shape outcomes.

As the only conference in New York State designed specifically for CACs and MDT members, NYSCA is proud to create a space that fosters both learning and connection. NYSCA introduced new opportunities for engagement by hosting vendor and exhibitor tables providing access to innovative resources.

RETIRING NYSCA BOARD MEMBERS

A huge thank you to the NYSCA Board for their continued dedication and time in supporting the NYSCA team. At this year’s conference, we recognized four outstanding board members as they retired from our board—Dave Mann, Luanne Mansfield, Joe Muroff, and Michael Polenberg celebrating their lasting contributions and commitment.



The NYSCA team experienced our busiest training year yet! With eight in-person training sessions and fifteen virtual standalone sessions, we reached over nine hundred New York CAC and MDT professionals, offering learning opportunities across a wide range of topics and skill levels. Our training calendar was intentionally designed to support all disciplines within the multidisciplinary team. From foundational content for newer professionals to more advanced, discussion-based sessions for seasoned staff, NYSCA created space for both skill building and meaningful conversation, ensuring teams at every level felt supported!

NYSCA was especially proud of our 2025 summer virtual training series, which featured five sessions led by NYS professionals from different CAC/MDT disciplines. This series helped participants understand each role within the CAC model and how those roles work together to support children and families, strengthening collaboration across teams.

In June, NYSCA launched a new training opportunity for members with the First Witness Child Advocacy Center. Thirty NYS CAC Victim Advocates came together to Albany, NY for a three-day training focused on strengthening advocacy practice and supporting children and non-offending caregivers.

In September, NYSCA partnered with Clinton County CAC and the START Children’s Center to host an MDT 360 training in Albany NY, welcoming over one hundred attendees for a comprehensive, multidisciplinary learning experience. Also, that month, NYSCA partnered with EAC Network to offer the FIND One-Day Training, focused on strengthening engagement and communication with children with disabilities within the CAC model.

These training efforts continue to strengthen multidisciplinary team response across the state, ensuring professionals and teams feel prepared, connected, and confident in their work with children and families.





STATEWIDE | OUTREACH

The **One Too Many NY 5K** was launched in 2020 at the height of the pandemic, when Child Advocacy Centers across New York were forced to cancel critical fundraising events. What began as a creative response quickly evolved into a meaningful statewide tradition—bringing communities together to support children and families impacted by abuse. Five years later, the event continues to grow, with another successful 5K held in 2025.

The 2025 event united 15 Child Advocacy Centers and the New York State Children’s Alliance, offering virtual, in-person, and hybrid participation options. More than 700 participants including children, families, colleagues, and even four-legged companions—took part across the state between Sept.19–21, demonstrating a shared commitment to protecting children. Together, participating CACs and NYSCA raised more than \$33,000 through registrations, peer-to-peer fundraising, and local sponsorships—critical funding that helps sustain services.

This success was made possible by the generosity of sponsors including Dot Foods, Wegmans, Mirabito Energy Products, Safe Horizon, Stewart’s Shops, Team Donut, Stegner Consulting & Training, Fidelis Care, Matthews Auto Group, and Ansun Graphics, along with many local sponsors supporting CACs across the state.

NYSCA also recognized participants with statewide awards such as Best Time, Best View on the Run, and the crowd-favorite “Dogs Need a 5K Too.” The Cortland County Child Advocacy Center once again led the state in registrations.



November 19th - December 3rd, NYSCA launched the first-ever **Bids for the Kids Online Auction**, creating a fun and meaningful way for supporters across NYS to give back while supporting Child Advocacy Centers and the children and families they serve.

The online auction featured an exciting variety of donated items and experiences, including sports memorabilia, travel packages, jewelry, gift baskets, and more. Community members, businesses, and supporters came together to make holiday shopping count for a great cause.

NYSCA is deeply grateful to everyone who donated items, placed bids, promoted the event, and helped us raise more than \$4,000 to support NYSCA’s mission.

ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

The NYSCA team and Board hosted a fun and engaging evening at All in Adventures Escape Rooms, where participants put their teamwork and collaboration skills to the test. Teams made up of NYSCA staff, Board members, and CAC professionals from across the state worked together to solve challenges and “escape” their rooms, with most groups successfully completing the experience. It was a great opportunity to connect, collaborate, and build stronger relationships in a relaxed setting.



Our 2025 Membership Meeting in Albany, NY was truly one for the books, bringing together more than 40 attendees from across the state. We kicked off the day with an informative session led by Edward Suk, Executive Director of the NCMEC Rochester Regional Office.

This training explored the extensive data collected by NCMEC, examined the impact of social media algorithms on children’s mental health, and offered practical strategies that CAC leaders can take back to their communities to help keep children safe. As CACs continue to navigate the challenges of an increasingly digital world, access to this data and insight helps MDTs stay informed and prepared to respond to emerging trends.

The NYSCA team also presented the 2024 Annual Report, highlighting the ongoing work to support CACs and MDTs across New York State. The presentation also celebrated the incredible efforts of our members, whose dedication and innovation continue to strengthen their communities and move the CAC movement forward.



2025 OCFS/NYSCA Regional Meetings

In the spring of 2025, the NYSCA team hosted five in person regional meetings, bringing CACs together within their respective regions to connect and share their experiences. Each meeting was hosted at a local CAC, providing a valuable opportunity for attendees to see firsthand how different centers are set up and how they operate as a multidisciplinary team. Thank you to all the centers who graciously hosted!

These meetings created space for open conversation with the NYSCA team and OCFS representatives about the day-to-day work happening in the field, as well as the challenges and successes unique to each region. Each meeting also included a one-hour training session for participants, featuring a variety of topics presented by NYSCA team members and partner organizations, including the NRCAC.

Overall, these regional meetings sparked meaningful discussions and valuable feedback, helping NYSCA better understand the needs of CACs and strengthen the support we provide across the state.



STOP CHILD ABUSE: BE THE ONE



Every adult has the power and responsibility to keep children safe. Will you BE THE ONE?



To a child, it doesn't matter who you are, it matters what action you take. Everyone can be part of the solution: teachers, parents, aunts, uncles, and friends.

In 2025, NYSCA's April Child Abuse Prevention campaign continued with a series of short social media videos highlighting some of our statewide partners and Child Advocacy Centers.

This public awareness campaign continues to provide information on how to recognize child abuse and neglect, and what actions the community can take to help prevent child abuse and BE THE ONE.



NYSCA continued its leadership giving program recognizing individuals, corporate champions, and foundations who contributed a minimum of \$1,000 to NYSCA, Inc. over the course of one fiscal year.

PUBLIC POLICY

Building on the framework and relationships built in 2024, NYSCA and our members continued to foster relationships between CACs and state and federal elected officials to garner support for funding and to strengthen laws to protect children.

ADVOCACY IN ALBANY

In February, the New York State Children’s Alliance and Child Advocacy Center leaders from across the state came together in Albany to meet with legislators, share the realities facing children and families, and elevate the critical role CACs play in providing a coordinated, trauma-informed response to abuse. That unified voice didn’t just shape the conversation—it helped drive a decisive shift in priorities, ensuring that the needs of children were seen, heard, and acted upon at the highest levels of state government.

With the passage of the state budget in April came exciting, long-awaited news: after more than a decade of level funding, New York State made a historic investment in children and families—doubling funding for CACs from \$7.2 million to \$14.46 million. This milestone was made possible by the persistent advocacy of NYSCA and its network of CACs, whose leadership, education efforts, and collective voice were instrumental in securing this critical increase. We are deeply grateful to Governor Hochul and the New York State Senate and Assembly for their leadership and commitment to New York’s children.

This increase has played a vital role in sustaining and strengthening the work of CACs across New York—providing stability for programs, supporting the dedicated professionals who serve children and families every day, and reinforcing a statewide commitment to a coordinated, child-centered response to abuse.



HILL DAY IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

Building on this momentum, in June, NYSCA and CAC representatives traveled to Washington, D.C., as part of the National Children’s Alliance Hill Day, meeting with members of the House and Senate to educate them on the vital work CACs do every day in their districts.

Together, these efforts reflect the strength and impact of NYSCA’s advocacy at both the state and federal levels—advancing policies and investments that better protect children and support their path to healing.
